Thistles galore! But does banning cosmetic use mean no pesticide use at all? Unfortunately, there are circumstances where the judicious use of pesticides seems the only solution. For example, in Whispering Woods in northwest Brentwood, a local volunteer group has been hand pulling thistles for many years. These efforts are proving to be futile, as the infestation has grown at an alarming and unmanageable rate.

Thus, the City of Calgary Natural Areas Department sent in a team to spray just the thistles with a selective herbicide called Transline. The aim of this specific administration is to bring the thistle population under control, such that future hand management is successful.

This herbicide was used only in the western areas of the park. The eastern grassland portions, as well as the adjacent Centennial Natureground Prairie Reclamation will continue to be managed by hand pulling.

But then there is still the matter of the smooth brome grass that is marching in on this precious remnant of original rough fescue grassland. There is no selective herbicide for this species, and the jury is still out on how to best preserve the rich but threatened biodiversity of this special space.
